Career Spotlight: Media Producer!

Career Description:

Film and video editors and camera operators typically do the following:

- Shoot and record television programs, films, music videos, documentaries, or news and sporting events
- Organize digital footage with video-editing software
- Collaborate with a director to determine the overall vision of the production
- Discuss filming and editing techniques with a director to improve a scene
- Select the appropriate equipment, such as the type of lens or lighting
- Shoot or edit a scene based on the director's vision

Required Education:

Most editor and camera operator positions require a bachelor's degree in a field related to film or broadcasting, such as communications.

Earnings:

The median annual wage for camera operators, television, video, and film was \$57,200 in May 2020. The median annual wage for film and video editors was \$67,250.

Future Outlook:

Demand for film and video editors and camera operators is increasing.

Climate Change...close to home



The climate of the Adirondacks has been changing for more than a century. Since 1900, the region has warmed by about 3 degrees Fahrenheit. In just the last three decades, lakes have started freezing later in the winter and thawing earlier in the spring. But a leading climate scientist in the Adirondacks says the biggest changes and threats to our way of life are yet to come. Paul Smith's professor Curt Stager coauthored a new paper with Brendan Wiltse and Skylar Murphy about how climate change will lead to shorter, milder winters and what that could mean for Adirondack communities.

"So it really hit me on an emotional level because I realized, as much as I'm interested in the animals, plants and lakes of the Adirondacks, I'm also interested in the people because I'm one of them and this is my home. I feel like winter is the season that defines the Adirondacks the most and tells me that I'm living here rather than in the Blue Ridge. So if we lose winter little by little, which it seems like we're doing, it's our cultural identity that is at the greatest risk because we can't migrate as Adirondackers and bring our Adirondack culture north. There's an international border there. So it really raised my awareness that we may well be watching the slow fading away of winter and with it, our traditions of the Winter Olympics and the Winter Carnival in Saranac Lake and the snowmobiling mecca in Old Forge".

- 1. Have at least 3 college applications completed, submitted, and confirmation received by Upward Bound by **November 30, 2022**.
- 2. Have your FAFSA and TAP applications completed and submitted by **December 1, 2022**.
- 3. Have 3 scholarship applications completed, submitted, and copied to Upward Bound by **April 30, 2023.**
- 4. Participate in at least **three** Upward Bound events with at least one each semester.
- 5. Have academic schedule/course changes approved *in advance* by your Upward Bound Counselor.
- 6. Remain in good academic standing throughout the entire academic year.
- * Your name will also be placed in a monthly drawing (October-May) to win Upward Bound swag for every month that you are on-track completing the above criteria. Use this guide as an incentive to meet important deadlines. Good luck!

Dell Scholars Program

The Dell Scholars Program recognizes students who have overcome significant obstacles to pursue their educations. Well beyond the financial support of \$20,000, a laptop and textbook credits, Dell also provides ongoing support and assistance to address all of the emotional, lifestyle, and financial changes that may prevent students from completing college.

Criteria for award:

- · Graduating from an accredited high school this academic year
- · Minimum 2.4 GPA (78 avg.)
- · Demonstrated need for financial assistance
- \cdot Participation in an approved college readiness program (i.e. Upward Bound)
- \cdot Ambition to enter a bachelor's degree program directly following high school graduation
- \cdot Eligible to receive a federal Pell grant in the first year of college

- \cdot Ability to communicate the hardships you have overcome or currently face

UB Student Academic Expectations... they're not that scary!



At the beginning of each Academic Year, all of our students review and sign the UB Letter of Expectations. The point of this process is to go over everything we expect from our students to best position them for acceptance into the college of their choice.

As you have heard us say many times, Upward Bound is a college-preparatory program... and we have certain expectations to help you there! Here they are:

- Participate in both the Academic and Summer portions of the program;
- Maintain regular contact with your UB Counselor during the year;
- Pursue the most challenging academic curriculum you can handle, including taking:
 - A minimum of 3 Regents courses in math and science
 - o A minimum of two years of language other than English in high school
 - 4 years of English and Social Studies
 - AP/CAP (dual enrollment) courses when available and appropriate;
- Attend classes regularly;
- Strive to improve your GPA each year;
- Take the SAT/ACT in the junior/senior year;
- Take and pass all Regents exams with at least a 65 or better.

Also:

If you are considering dropping or changing courses, please let your UB Counselor know before you make any changes. They are the experts and will go over any unexpected consequences of your decision.

We also want you to participate in a total of 3 UB activities during the Academic Year, with at least one in each semester. Being involved in the program will set you up with the skills and knowledge it takes to be successful in college!
